OUR MISSION

The Nobody's Children Foundation exists to ensure a safe childhood to every child. We protect children from abuse and help child victims.

We carry out our mission by:

- Teaching adults how to treat children without abuse
- Showing them what to do when they suspect a child might have been abused
- Teaching children how to avoid violence and abuse
- Offering psychological and legal help to abused children and their caregivers
- Modifying the Polish law to ensure the best possible protection of children's interests.

In 2012 the Foundation carried out the following programmes and projects:

"MAZOWIECKA" Child Advocacy Centre

Programme carried out since 2003

Goals: To provide interdisciplinary help for child victims and their families or caregivers

Main activities: psychological, psychiatric, and legal help for child victims and their families, supporting professionals who help child victims. •

Programme activities in 2012:

- Providing psychological and pedagogical consultations, psychiatric consultations, legal advice, and individual therapy for child victims, their parents and caregivers. Crisis interventions in cases of suspected crimes against children (especially child sexual abuse and physical abuse)
- Consultations for professionals (pedagogic counsellors, psychologists, probation officers, health care professionals, and social workers) who identify or suspect child abuse or crimes against children
- Providing a course on counteracting child abuse (360 hrs, 38 graduates)
- Providing two editions of a course on preparing forensic psychological opinions in cases involving children (200 hrs, 40 graduates)
- Providing a course on working with sexually abused children (160 hrs, 16 graduates)
- 5 meetings of the "Psychology Expert Club" for 40 participants
- 3 meetings within the Abused Child Seminar for 55 participants
- Meetings and training for students of the Warsaw Medical University on preventing child abuse (60 hrs, about 300 participants)
- Training for criminal judges, prosecutors, psychology expert witnesses, and other professionals from all over Poland; a video conference at the General Public Prosecutor's Office on the procedure of interviewing child witnesses – for prosecutors from all over Poland (about 640 participants)
- Running a psycho-educational group for parents and two socio-educational groups for children

- Implementing a self-reliance promoting programme for young people, "Accordion of Self-Reliance"
- Running groups for children and parents
- Supervision for professionals of the Warsaw Network for Helping Children
- Supervision for psychology expert witnesses
- Running a Child Friendly Interview Room
- Welfare services for the centre's clients
- Implementing the programme "Child Victim Advocate"
- Coordinating the Warsaw Network for Helping Children

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Child: Witness with Special Needs

Programme carried out since 2002

Goals: To improve the situation of children participating in legal procedures through educating professionals and raising their awareness

Main activities: Granting certificates to Child Friendly Interview Rooms to improve the standard of facilities where children are interviewed; providing training for judges, prosecutors, police officers, expert witnesses, psychologists and pedagogic counsellors on how to prepare children for interviews and training designed to improve their interviewing skills; publishing materials targeted at professionals, parents, and child witnesses.

- Organization of the 9th National Conference on Helping Child Victims of Crime

- Organizing a meeting to commemorate the 5th anniversary of the Coalition for Child Friendly Interviewing
- Coordinating the meetings of the Council of Experts for Protecting Child Victims of Crime
- Running a webpage on protecting children involved in criminal procedures

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Warsaw Network for Helping Children

Programme carried out since 2010

Goals: To extend access to assessment/diagnosis and intervention in cases of suspected sexual abuse and to psychological help for sexually abused children

Main activities: Assessment/diagnosis, intervention, and psychological help in cases of child sexual abuse; consultations for parents and professionals in situations of child sexual abuse.

Programme activities in 2012:

The Warsaw Network for Helping Children comprises 22 institutions providing psychological help in cases of child sexual abuse, located all around Warsaw. The Network’s activities are coordinated by the Nobody’s Children Foundation. Therapists from the Mazowiecka Child Advocacy Centre have trained psychologists and pedagogic counsellors working at the Network’s institutions and conducted supervision sessions for

them. Furthermore, the Mazowiecka Centre organizes training, workshops, and seminars for professionals from the Network’s institutions. Once in two months special meetings are organized to monitor programme coordinators and representatives of the Social Policy Bureau and Education Bureau of the Warsaw City Hall.

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Good Parent – Good Start

Programme carried out since 2007

Goals: To protect young children (0–6) from abuse by supporting and educating their parents/caregivers in parenting without violence; to promote good parenting.

Main activities: Direct support for parents with young children (education, psychological help, workshops); support for professionals working with parents of young children; supporting interdisciplinary work.

Programme activities in 2012:

- Direct help for families with high risk of abusing young children (consultations, workshops, educational meetings, Active Mondays, an away-from-home therapeutic and educational session, online counselling centre, website)
- Local System for Preventing Abuse of Young Children operating in 14 districts of Warsaw: Praga-Południe, Praga-Północ, Bródno, Białołęka, Wawer, Wesoła, Wola, Ochota, Żoliborz, Wilanów, Ursynów, Rembertów, Mokotów, and Śródmieście
- Training and supervision for professionals (social workers, nurses and midwives, psychologists, police officers, and probation officers)
- 5th National Conference “Preventing Abuse of Young Children” in Warsaw

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We Protect Children

Programme carried out since 2010

“We Protect Children” is an original child abuse prevention programme carried out by the Nobody’s Children Foundation in cooperation with the local authorities. The main idea of the programme is to grant certificates to education and care institutions to attest their conformity with child protection standards. In 2012 the programme was targeted at Warsaw’s nurseries, kindergartens in the Praga-Południe district, and Warsaw’s residential care institutions (children’s homes). It was joined by 42 nurseries, 16 kindergartens, and 17 residential care institutions.

Programme activities in 2012:

- Training for professionals on topics including: assessment and intervention in cases of child abuse, standards of implementing a child protection policy in institutions, legal aspects of child protection, and preparation for conducting classes for children and parents
- Educational meetings for parents
- Supervisions for professionals working at residential care institutions

- Organization of monitoring meetings for programme implementers

The programme in numbers in 2012:

- Training for residential care institutions’ staff (5 training series, 92 hrs, 55 participants)

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116 111 Helpline for Children and Youth

Programme carried out since 2008

Goals: To help children and young people in need of support, care, and protection; to improve callers' safety.

Main activities: Telephone and online support for children and young people in difficult situations, education and promotion efforts encouraging young people to seek help and use the helpline's services.

Programme activities in 2012:

- Operating a free helpline 116 111, 7 days a week, from 12.00 to 20.00
- Running the programme's website www.116111.pl
- Anonymous online counselling for persons who used the "Ask us a question" bookmark on www.116111.pl
- Preparing and distributing educational packages of the 116 111 Helpline (lesson plans, posters, leaflets-bookmarks) for schools and residential care institutions in Poland, representatives of the police, and 116 111 Helpline Ambassadors
- Developing and implementing 2 one-year trainee programmes in the 116 111 Helpline for Children and Youth, and a summer trainee programme in online help
- Organizing a celebration of the International Child Helpline Day
- Organizing a competition for children on the occasion of the International Child Helpline Day; organizing a competition on the 116 111 Helpline's birthday, "116 111 Mascot"
- Participating in picnics and educational meetings, organizing an educational picnic on the birthday of CosmoGolem, the Warsaw Symbol of Children's Rights – www.cosmogolem.pl

- Providing lectures and workshops for professionals on the services of the 116 111 Helpline and educational tools to be used when working with children and young people

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Child in the Web

Programme carried out since 2004

Goals: To assess the scale and characteristics of online threats to children; to prevent risks to the youngest internet users; to help children who face online threats.

Main activities: Research and analyses, education projects, media campaigns, telephone and online help.

- A social campaign on excessive Internet use, "Which World Do You Live in?"
- A media campaign on the occasion of the Safer Internet Day "We Discover the Digital World Together. Safely".
- A media campaign on privacy on the Internet, "Take Care of Face"
- A campaign on protecting children's privacy, "Think Twice Before Uploading!"
- Developing and launching a web browser BeSt.
- An education campaign carried out in cooperation with the Education Bureau of the Warsaw City Hall, "Neciowe Przedszkole" (Nettie's Kindergarten)
- Developing and conducting e-learning courses for children
- Organizing a series of picnics "Sieciaki (Web Kids) on Holiday"
- Creating an e-learning platform for libraries
- A training programme developed in cooperation with Wydawnictwo Nowa Era (a publishing company), "Information Technology of the 21st Century"

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Childhood without Abuse

Programme carried out since 2005

Goals: To improve the child protection system in countries of Eastern Europe through raising professionals' skills, helping child victims and their families, and raising public awareness

Main activities: Social campaigns, training, and supervisions provided by Polish and foreign experts; publications targeted at professionals, parents, and children; participating in conferences and study visits. The programme has been carried out in partnership with NGOs in Bulgaria, Lithuania, Latvia, Moldova, and Ukraine. Running an English-language website www.canee.net

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Preventing Commercial Exploitation of Children

Programme carried out since 2004

Goals: To prevent commercial child exploitation through raising awareness and knowledge among professionals and the general public

Main activities: Organizing and providing training for professionals, raising awareness through publications and a dedicated website, assessing the efficiency of the system for protecting child victims of trafficking and children at risk, lobbying efforts for implementing model solutions and initiating a public debate about the situation of children threatened with commercial exploitation

Programme activities in 2012:

- Carrying out the 2nd stage of the "Don't Lose" campaign and a campaign for preventing violence and child abuse within the programme "Safer Together"; developing lesson plans and videos; organizing training and conferences
- Publishing an educational game "Don't Lose!" within the Ministry of Education's programme "With Passion on First Name Terms", conducting training for professionals working with children and young people aged 13-18
- Winning the status of an official representative of the Code of Conduct designed to protect children from sexual exploitation in tourism, and conducting training for the staff of the Orbis Hotel Group, which was the first signatory to the Code of Conduct
- Participating in the activities of the Working Group of the Ministry of Internal Affairs' Team for Combating and Preventing Human Trafficking
- Developing the report Human trafficking and prostitution-related crimes against minors

- Publishing ECPAT International's brochure on preventing sexual exploitation of children in tourism

- Taking part in the international project "Child trafficked for exploitation in begging and criminality: Challenges for law enforcement and child protection", organized by the Council of the Baltic Sea States

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Grant Programme

From 2010 to 2012 the Nobody's Children Foundation carried out a grant programme "Safe Childhood", funded by the Velux Foundations. The programme was targeted at NGOs that support local communities in protecting children from violence and abuse. The "Safe Childhood" programme supported the implementation of projects in the areas of keeping children safe online, preventing abuse of young children, and helping child victims of crime and abuse.

Main activities: Personal, telephone and online consultations for the Nobody's Children Foundation's clients; handling the legal aspects of the Foundation's programmes and undertaking legal interventions.

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Research Department

Goals: To expand knowledge about child abuse; to prepare assessments and expert evaluations for programmes carried out by the Nobody's Children Foundation.

Main activities: Research conducted by the NCF includes local studies as well as national and international research programmes, which enables the Foundation not only to observe trends in children's situation in Poland, but also to compare Polish data with findings from other European countries. Within its research activity, the Foundation cooperates regularly with experts and research institutions in Poland and abroad.

Activities in 2012:

- EU-NET-ADB – a study on Internet addiction among adolescents (aged 15–16); analysis and publication of findings from the study
- National assessment of violence against children – a survey of 1005 children and young people aged 11–17: developing research tools, conducting a pilot study, conducting the survey
- "SocialWeb-SocialWork" – evaluation of a pilot training programme for social workers working with children and young people concerning safe Internet use

- "Lost Children" – assessment of the problem in Poland within an international project
- An omnibus study on verbal abuse
- A quantitative and qualitative survey of employees of the Orbis Hotel Group, focusing on their attitudes and experiences concerning commercial exploitation of children – within the project of implementing the Code of Conduct in the hotels of the Orbis Group
- A focus group study concerning Internet use and cyberbullying among young people – within the SuperKids project
