NOBODY'S CHILDREN FOUNDATION, 2014 ACTIVITY REPORT

The Nobody's Children Foundation exists to ensure a safe childhood to every child. We protect children from abuse and help child victims.

We carry out our mission by:

- Teaching adults how to treat children without abuse
- Showing them what to do when they suspect a child might have been abused
- Teaching children how to avoid violence and abuse
- Offering psychological and legal help to abused children and their caregivers
- Modifying the Polish law to ensure the best possible protection of children's interests.

In 2014 the Foundation carried out the following programmes and projects:

"Mazowiecka" Child Advocacy Centre

Programme carried out since 2003.

Goals: To provide interdisciplinary help for child victims and their families or caregivers.

Main activities: psychological, psychiatric, and legal help for child victims and their families, supporting professionals who help child victims.

Programme activities in 2014:

- Providing psychological and pedagogical consultations, psychiatric consultations, legal advice, and individual therapy for child victims, their parents, and caregivers; crisis intervention in cases of suspected crimes against children (especially child sexual abuse and physical abuse)
- Consultations for professionals (pedagogic counsellors, psychologists, health care professionals, and social workers) who identify or suspect child abuse or crimes against children
- Two editions of a course on preparing forensic psychological opinions in cases involving children (200 hrs., 41 participants)
- Two editions of a course on assessment, intervention, and psychological help in cases of child sexual abuse – for professionals in the Warsaw Network for Helping Children (240 hrs., 47 participants)
- Training for students of the Warsaw Medical University on preventing child abuse (65 hrs., about 280 participants)
- Training for professionals from all over Poland (581 participants)
- Running 2 psycho-educational groups and 2 support groups for parents and caregivers (84 participants)
- Running two socio-educational groups and two socio-therapeutic groups for children and young people (36 participants)
- Carrying out a programme aimed at supporting young people's autonomy and self-reliance, Accordeon Samodzielności (Accordeon of Self-reliance)
- Running individual or group meetings for children and parents: preparation for interviews of child witnesses (56 participants)
- Supervision for professionals of the Warsaw Network for Helping Children, psychology court experts, social workers,

employees of residential care institutions, employees of the children's hospital in Józefów, and other professionals

- Running a Child Friendly Interview Room (175 interviews)
- Forensic psychological examinations
- Welfare services for the centre's clients (201,328 PLN)
- Implementing the "Child Victim Advocate" programme
- Coordinating the Warsaw Network for Helping Children
- Participating in meetings of multidisciplinary teams
- Carrying out a trainee programme.

The programme in numbers in 2014:

- **1,730** individual meetings (diagnostic, therapeutic, and counselling sessions with a psychologist/therapist) with children
- **2099** individual meetings (diagnostic, therapeutic, and counselling sessions with a psychologist/therapist) with adults

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Warsaw Network for Helping Children



Programme carried out since 2010.

Goals: To improve access to assessment/diagnosis and intervention in cases of suspected sexual abuse and to psychological help for sexually abused children.

Main activities: Assessment/diagnosis, intervention, and psychological help in cases of child sexual abuse; consultations for parents and professionals in situations of child sexual abuse.

Programme activities in 2014:

The Warsaw Network for Helping Children comprises 20 institutions providing psychological help in cases of child sexual abuse, located all around Warsaw. The Network's activities are coordinated by the Nobody's Children Foundation. Therapists from the "Mazowiecka" Child Advocacy Centre have trained psychologists and pedagogic counsellors working at the Network's institutions and conducted supervision sessions for them. Furthermore, the Mazowiecka Centre organizes training, workshops, and seminars for professionals from the Network's institutions. Once in two

months special monitoring meetings are organized for coordinators and representatives of the Social Policy Bureau and the Education Bureau of the Warsaw City Hall.

The programme in numbers in 2014:

- **11** supervision sessions during which 46 cases of sexually abused children were discussed

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Good Parent – Good Start

Programme carried out since 2007.

Goals: To protect young children (0–6) from abuse by supporting and educating their parents/caregivers in parenting without violence; to promote good parenting.

Main activities: Direct support for parents with young children (education, psychological help, workshops); support for professionals working with parents of young children; supporting multidisciplinary work.

Programme activities in 2014:

- Direct help for families with high risk of abusing young children (consultations, workshops, educational meetings, Active Mondays, an away-from-home therapeutic and educational session, online counselling centre, website) and for young children who have experienced abuse
- Local System for Preventing Abuse of Young Children operating in all districts of Warsaw
- Training, seminars, and supervision for professionals (social workers, nurses and midwives, psychologists, police officers, and probation officers)

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We Protect Children



Programme carried out since 2010.

“We Protect Children” is an original child abuse prevention programme carried out by the Nobody’s Children Foundation in cooperation with the Ministry of National Education and local authorities. The goal of the programme is to protect children from violence inflicted by adults (such as parents or institutional staff). The programme is carried out by implementing the child protection standards defined in the Child Protection Policy adopted by institutions. Institutions that meet the standards of protecting children from abuse are granted “We Protect Children” certificates.

Programme activities in 2014:

- Training for professionals on topics including: assessment and intervention in cases of child abuse, standards of implementing a child protection policy in institutions, legal aspects of child protection, and preparation for conducting classes for children and parents
- Assessing educational needs and the level of standard implementation at schools and kindergartens across Poland

- Developing training plans for professionals on topics such as the child protection policy, identifying child abuse, intervention in cases of child abuse, and prevention of child abuse
- Developing the programme’s website, www.chronimydzieci.pl.

Programme carried out since 2007.

Goals: To help children and young people in need of support, care, and protection; to help parents and teachers who need support and information in helping children who face problems or difficulties.

Main activities: Telephone and online support for children and young people in difficult situations, telephone and online consultations for parents and teachers; education and promotion efforts encouraging people to seek help and use the helplines' services.

Programme activities in 2014:

- Operating a free helpline 116 111, 7 days a week, from 12.00 to 20.00
- Operating a free helpline 800 100 100 – from Monday to Friday, from 12.00 to 18.00
- Running the programme's website www.116111.pl and anonymous online counselling for persons who used the "Ask us a question" bookmark on www.116111.pl
- Developing the www.800100100.pl website and online counselling for parents and professionals on keeping children safe
- Preparing and distributing educational packages of the 116 111 Helpline (lesson plans, posters, leaflets-bookmarks) for schools and residential care institutions in Poland, representatives of the police, and professionals who help children

- Developing and implementing 2 one-year trainee programmes in the 116 111 Helpline for Children and Youth, and a summer trainee programme in online help
- Organizing a celebration of the International Child Helpline Day
- Participating in picnics and educational meetings for children and parents
- Providing lectures and workshops for professionals on the services of the 116 111 Helpline and educational tools to be used when working with children and young people.

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Child in the Web

Programme carried out since 2004.

Goals: To prevent online risks to the youngest internet users; to help children who face online threats; to assess the scale and characteristics of online threats to children.

Main activities: Education projects, media campaigns, telephone and online help, research and analyses.

Programme activities in 2014:

- Organizing the Safer Internet Day, including a campaign “Together we Create a Better Internet”
- “School Kids on the Web: Online Safety and Privacy at School” – a conference organized together with SaveGov.org
- Organizing the 7th International Conference on Keeping Children and Young People Safe Online
- Organizing seminars: “How to protect children from online gambling?”, “Internet in moderation” – on the excessive Internet use among children and young people; training courses for young people
- Participating in and coordinating an initiative called “Wielki Marsz” (Great March)
- Developing and distributing lesson plans on the safe use of new technologies, “Sieciaki.pl”, and new educational scripts “Sieciakowa szkoła” (Web Kids’ school)

- Making an education video Excessive Internet Use among Children and Young People

- Providing lectures and workshops for professionals about children’s safety on the Internet
- Conducting research on sexting among young people

- Publishing and distributing Numa Numa, a magazine addressing issues related to online safety (additional copies were also printed), the Sie Wie magazine (additional copies), and the Sieciaki cartoon.

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Childhood without Abuse

Programme carried out since 2005.

Goals: To improve the child protection system in countries of Eastern Europe through raising professionals’ skills, helping child victims and their families, and raising public awareness. Since September 2014 the programme has focused on preventing sexual abuse of children and young people.

Main activities: Social campaigns, training, and supervisions provided by Polish and foreign experts; publications targeted at professionals, parents, and children; participating in conferences and study visits. The programme has been carried out in partnership with NGOs in Bulgaria, Lithuania, Latvia, Moldova, and Ukraine. Running an English-language website, www.canee.net.

Programme activities in 2014:

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Preventing Commercial Exploitation of Children

Programme carried out since 2004.

Goals: To prevent commercial child exploitation by raising awareness and knowledge among professionals and the general public.

Main activities: Organizing and providing training for professionals, raising awareness through publications and a dedicated website, assessing the efficiency of the system for protecting child victims of trafficking and children at risk, lobbying efforts for implementing model solutions and initiating a public debate about the situation of children threatened with commercial exploitation.

Programme activities in 2014:

- Training courses for professionals about commercial exploitation of children (tourist trade employees, police officers, teachers)
- Classes and lectures for students of tourism
- Participating in seminars and conferences about preventing commercial exploitation of children, including human trafficking, and about the problem of unaccompanied children and refugees

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Grant Programme “Safe Childhood”

From 2010 to 2013 the Nobody’s Children Foundation carried out a grant programme “Safe Childhood”, funded by the Velux Foundations. The programme was targeted at NGOs that support local communities in protecting children from violence and abuse. The “Safe Childhood” programme supported the implementation of projects in the areas of keeping children safe online, preventing abuse of young children, and helping child victims of crime and abuse. The programme is being continued in the years 2013-2016.

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Legal Department

Goals: To provide legal help for the Foundation's clients and in-house legal advice/services; to improve the situation of children participating in legal procedures through education and raising awareness among professionals.

Main activities: Personal, telephone and online consultations for the Nobody's Children Foundation's clients; handling the legal aspects of the Foundation's programmes and undertaking legal interventions. As part of the "Child Friendly Justice" programme – granting certificates to Child Friendly Interview Rooms to improve the quality of facilities where children are interviewed; conducting training for judges, prosecutors, police officers, and court experts, as well as for psychologists and pedagogic counsellors on how to prepare children for interviews and how to interview children; publishing activity targeted at professionals, parents, and child witnesses.

Abused Child: Theory, Research, and Practice is a periodical published by the Nobody's Children Foundation, a multidisciplinary quarterly journal. Its main goal is to expand knowledge about different aspects of child abuse among professionals including psychologists, educators, paediatricians and other health care professionals, lawyers, policy makers and others. The quarterly cooperates with international periodicals focusing on the problem of child abuse, such as Child Abuse and Neglect and Child Maltreatment.

"Abused Child. Theory, Research and Practice" is included in the Ministry of Science and Higher Education's list of academic journals (part B, 6 points).

In 2014 four issues of the quarterly were published: vol. 13, No. 1, 2, 3, 4.
