



Report 2009

For our Foundation 2009 was a year of building up cooperation with our partners in Poland and other European countries, and sharing good practices in helping children and protecting them from abuse.

We began developing the Warsaw Network for Helping Sexually Abused Children, which was joined by 26 help institutions operating in Warsaw. Psychologists

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and pedagogic counsellors from these institutions took part in a training course designed to prepare them to diagnose and provide psychological help for victims of child sexual abuse. In 2010 this cooperation will help expand the range of services available in Warsaw in such difficult cases.

Last year many of our activities focused on the problem of corporal punishment

of children. Propositions of legislative modifications were accompanied by a campaign titled Childhood without Violence, which was joined by several hundred organizations and institutions. Hundreds of professionals participated in training and conferences organized within the campaign, tens of thousands of parents were provided with educational materials about how to raise children without beating and other forms of abuse.

We expanded and improved methods of educating children on Internet-related threats. So far, more than 140 thousand children have signed up for our new Sieciaki.2.0 site launched in 2009!

Tens of thousands of children sought help and support through the Foundation's dedicated helplines: 116 111 and Helpline.org.pl.

Several child interview facilities across Poland were granted the Child Friendly Interview Room certificates, which are awarded by the Foundation and the Ministry of Justice. In six countries of Central and Eastern Europe we organized - together with our local partners - the Child: Witness with Special Needs campaign. The first child friendly interview rooms were also established in these countries.

The Nobody's Children **Foundation**

has operated since 1991. It is the largest Polish NGO active in the area of protecting children from abuse and helping child victims, their families and caregivers.

The Good Parent – Good Start programme shared its two years' experience with other organizations by publishing a manual on how to organize a local system for preventing abuse of young children.

This is just a handful of information about our activities in 2009. You are invited to learn more abut them by reading this Report.



116 111 Helpline for Children And Youth





Activities in 2009:

On 11 September 2009 in the Pole Mokotowskie Park in Warsaw there appeared Cosmo Golem - a 4-meter giant with a little window in the heart, through which children can toss slips of paper with their requests and dreams. It is the 13th such a statue in the world, regarded as a universal symbol of children's rights. Golem is another project after the 116 111 Helpline for Children and Young People – implemented by the Nobody's Children Foundation and Polkomtel SA (the operator of the Plus mobile network) for the benefit of children. lesson scenarios for secondary schools, training for pedagogic counsellors and psychologists from various regions of Poland (1)
