## Introduction

Every child deserves a childhood free from violence. For 33 years, the Empowering Children Foundation, hereinafter referred to as "Foundation", has been:

- protecting children from violence and sexual abuse;
- providing children and their guardians with support, professional psychological, and legal assistance;
- teaching adults how to wisely and effectively respond to violence against children and what to do if they suspect a child is being harmed;
- supporting and engaging parents to raise their children with love and respect;
- influencing Polish law to best protect the interests of children.

The year 2023 at the Empowering Children Foundation in numbers:

- 444 children received psychological assistance;
- 865 guardians received psychological support;
- 5 047 psychological consultations and individual therapy sessions for children;
- 5 671 psychological consultations and individual therapy sessions for guardians;
- 68 866 calls received from children and adolescents;
- 16 726 participants in our conferences;
- 42 069 people signed our appeals and petitions.

Funds from the 1.5% of personal income tax donation scheme are used to finance statutory activities in support of children and their families, administrative costs, and fixed assets related to these activities.

The Foundation maintains a separate record of the expenditure of funds obtained from the 1.5% tax allocation.

The Empowering Children Foundation supported other non-governmental organizations operating locally through regranting within projects conducted with UNHCR, Plan International, OAK, Ikea, and Save the Children. In 2023, together with our grantors, we supported 24 non-governmental organizations. As part of the regranting activities, therapeutic and psychiatric help for children and adolescents, including Ukrainian children, legal assistance, supervision for the grantees' staff (both individual and group), and substantive support for professionals were provided; as well as renovation works and equipment for child help centres.

The Foundation uses loans provided by the Towarzystwo Inwestycji Społeczno-Ekonomicznych SA with interest rates ranging from 0.88% to 1.75%. Loan repayments are made on time as specified in the agreements.

Loans provided by the Towarzystwo Inwestycji Społeczno-Ekonomicznych SA are secured with promissory notes and a mortgage on the Foundation's property amounting to 1 110.

## 7. Accruals

Statutory income is recognized in the profit and loss account when the Foundation gains the right to receive the income based on ownership rights to the funds provided by grantors and donors. In the case of funds obtained for specific activities and actions, the unspent amount is deferred in the balance sheet and included in deferred income at an amount corresponding to the costs incurred for the financed activities.

## 10. Contingent liabilities

The Foundation has not been subject to tax authority audits. Tax settlements may be audited for up to five years. As a result, the amounts reported in the financial statements may change after their final determination by the tax authorities.

Regulations on VAT, corporate and personal income tax, property tax, and social security contributions are subject to change, often lacking clear references to established regulations or legal precedents. The existing regulations also contain ambiguities, leading to differing opinions on the legal interpretation of tax regulations between state authorities and businesses. Tax and other settlements (e.g., customs or foreign exchange) can be audited by authorities with the power to impose significant penalties, and the additional liabilities determined as a result of audits must be paid with interest. These factors increase tax risk in Poland compared to countries with more developed tax systems.
